Contact your veterinarian if your pet is vomilling, lethargic or foaming at the mouth. Keep pets away Irom holi-day decorations and never leave pets unsupervised around the tree. Intest this bons and angel hair can cause intestinab libickages if swallowed. Glass balls may be 'letched' off the tree and break.

Also, ingested pine needles can puncture your pet's inteses; vacuum around the

tines; vacuum around the tree frequently;
; Preservatives, aspirin or sugar used to prolong a tree's life may harm your pet if the water is ingested. Aspirin is especially deadly for cats.

Make sure lights and elec-trical cords are out of reach. Besides the risk of electrocu-tion, the whole tree may top-ple over.

ple over. Keep pets away from rib-bons and bows. Cats find them fascinating; however, they are a serious choking hazard.

Make sure pets are secure while you are enterfailing.
