Farmington Hills annual fis-cal audit report shows the city's fund balance at a healthy \$5.5 million and its operation tax rate of 10.165 mills has not changed in five years. A mill is \$1 for every \$1,000 of a home's state equalized value. For year ending June 30, 2002, the city's total revenues were \$44.463,000, with the city's operatural lew generating.

city's operating levy generating 57 percent of the budget, fol-57 percent of the budget, fol-lowed by intergovernmental revenues at 20 percent; charges for services at 14 percent; and interest and fines at 8 percent.

Expenditures were \$43,100,000 with public safety S43,100,000 with public safety swallowing 40 percent of the budget, followed by public serv-ices at 31 percent; general gov-ernment at 17 percent; library, 7 percent; and the district court at 5 percent. The city's fund balance is 13 percent of next year's projected budget, said the Doug Bohrer with the auditing firm of Plante & Moran.
