

# CC swimmers working to replace lost talent

Redford-Detroit Catholic Central lost 11 swimmers from a team that placed fourth at the Division I state meet last season. Coach Jeff Baker knows that, barring a miracle, the Shamrocks won't be able to match that as a team.

But some solid returnees and promising newcomers should give CC a solid showing in the Catholic League as well as some state-level performances.

"We've had some kids make the state cut already," said Baker. "It's tough to continue at the level we did last year, because we lost so many swimmers. But we have talent back and the younger kids have picked up a lot quickly and worked hard to improve their strokes."

Rob Cyrk has already made the state cut in the IM and the butterfly, while Andrew Carlin is close in the IM and the 100

freestyle. Chris Banas is the top returning flyer.

The Shamrocks have already met the state standard for the 200 and 400 meters. Sprinter Dan Jones is back as well, while distance man Joe Zatkoff is out until February with a broken hand. Diver Joe Rohde qualified for the state meet last year and will be pushed by Nick Riley. Ryan Campbell and Tyler Flood, the latter when he recovers from a broken arm.

"We've got relays and individual state cuts from the five swimmers," said Baker. "But some of our new swimmers are doing well. Gannon McLean has done well, has mastered all four strokes and had some amazingly fast relay splits in Toledo. Eric Weber is still working to improve but might be one of the best distance swimmers we have," and Jay Gilman has been a pleasant surprise in the sprints and the butterfly."

Thomas Naughton, Newman, Asmar and Lucas DiGina comprised the medley relay team, and the 400 freestyle team consisted of Valterra, Bank, Keith Jones and Bouchrouche.

"I'm happy with where we are in that we should have opportunities for a lot of kids to have the state-meet experience," Dutilleul said. "I think we'll have a lot of fun along the way. The fact we are Division II for the state meet we do have some more realistic times for the kids to try to achieve."

"The kids who have no

chance to make a Division I cut will look at a Division II cut and say, 'Well, maybe I do have a shot at that.'"

extremely well. She's definitely the top-ranked girl in the Mount Brighton Association."

Zaleski, a co-captain with seniors Margot Spica and Kelly Martin, and Kujala were individual state qualifiers. Kujala was 18th in the slalom and Zaleski was in the 30s in both events.

"She's definitely 10 to 15 spots up from that," Gable said of Zaleski. "She could break into the top 15, and I think Liz is a top-10 state skier in both events."

Nicole is skiing really strong; she has a good stance with a lot of balance and speed. My guess is we're talking about one-two in both (league) events with those two young ladies. In the regional, both could be in the top five."

With two skiers capable of doing that well, the Marlins are in an advantageous position,

because the other girls only need to be consistent to turn Mercy into a powerhouse team, Gable said.

Entering the season, Spica is the team member of the disappointing event. She had some good finishes last year and was consistently in the top 15 in the league all season.

"There's no question she'll be moving into the top 10," Gable said. "She's definitely improving. She has a lot of experience from last year. She's stronger and skiing with more confidence."

Spica and some other skiers who are ready to assume larger roles will compensate for the loss of Dana Woolley, Rachel Rozycy and Melissa Desautel due to graduation.

Martin had a few starts at the end of last season and skied well, Gable said, adding he expects the momentum to carry over this season for her.

Senior Nikki Cwirka was the league JV winner in both events. She's a very fast skier

who is working hard to improve her technique, according to Gable.

Junior Kat Shriner also placed well in the JV meet, finishing among the top three in both events. Of all the improvement made by the Mercy skiers, Shriner has made the biggest strides, Gable said, adding she is 60 to 65 percent improved.

"If she keeps that up, we'll be lifting her bar for competition amongst the ladies," Gable said. "She'll be challenging the seniors to make sure they're skiing as fast as they can, so she doesn't take their spot from them."

Sophomore Rachelle Beazley, who made the team last year but suffered an injury, is healthy again and is a talented skier who could crack the line-up, according to Gable.

"We'll have a full complement of 15," he said. "I don't want to sell any of them short, but I think the girls are up and coming and will be running mostly JV."

"But any one from the back

end could take off like a rocket, and that would make me very happy."

Unlike recent years, the Marlins have been able to do a lot of early training due to two good snowfalls in late 2002.

"The early snow was a god-send," Gable said. "I'm hard pressed to remember the last time we had really good conditions in November and December. We've had more time on the hill than I can remember."

"Even though we haven't set a lot of gates for training, the girls spent a lot of time free skiing. I'm a big believer in a strong developmental process in ski racing."

"It's worked for the Austrians. They do a lot before they get into the discipline of course setting."

The course will be set Tuesday, and the Marlins appear ready to make another successful run.

"Pat could be the skier to beat at Mt. Brighton," said Gable. "His ability has improved, he can read courses better. He needs to know when to challenge the course and when not to. If he does well, it could inspire the rest of the guys. Che has the most experience of the group and has been improving. He's a strong skier, but needs to increase his speed on the course."

"Eric was consistent last year and began to ski stronger and had better finishes as the year was ending out. He could be a top-10 skier there."

Brandon Gualdoni, another captain, went to camp and has also shown solid improvement while Craig Kamen is also on the right track. The top two junior varsity racers from last year - Eric Ceclan and Nick Barilovich - are also ready to compete. Juniors Mark Hemmings and Mike McClain

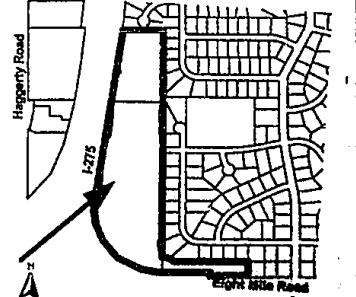
