moisture away from your skin, promoting the process by which your body naturally regulates its temperature.
Unlike wool, it has a soft touch and is lightweight. Down comforters are also lighter than polyester ones and, if well-cleaned, have less potential for dust mite accumulation.
Frequently, individuals who believe they are aftergic to down are, in fact, having a reaction to dust mites, said Matz at Eddie Bauer.

are aftergic to down are, in fact, having a reaction to dust mites, said Matz at Eddie Bauer.

Dust mites are a problem in down products either when the down hasn't been properly eleaned during manufacturing or the comforter is in need of routine eleaning, about every two to three years.

For people who suffer from allergies, if you are truly allergie to birds then down is not for you. But if you are not, you are probably better off with a down product than a polyester one, said Matz.

The tight weave of down comforter shells prevents not only down clusters from excaping but also dust mites from getting inside, she said.

Don't underestimate the look of down, either. Appearances affect sleep and well-being, said Albrecht.

"With down, you get loft, you get a beautiful look that's coy and it kind of envelops you." And, sometimes, looking like is feeling like, said Matz.

"If you think about it, it's like falling asleep In a cloud."
