# **Cutting education** funds isn't the answer

Local school systems got a jolt hast week.
Gov. Jennifer Granholm announced that, unless the Legislature acts, she would cut school foundation grants by an average of \$56 per pupil for this year. The basic foundation grant is \$6,700 per pupil.
Granholm acted because of a shortfall of \$127 million in the state's \$12,7 billion school ald budget and a state has requiring a balanced school budget. The action followed announcements that foundation grants would be fiven for the next two school was.

law requiring a balanced school budget. The action tol-lowed announcements that foundation grants would be frozen for the next two school years.

The state Legislature has 30 days to act before Granholm's plan takes effect and the Democratic gover-nor has said ahe is willing to work with the Republican-dominated Legislature to find some solution to the prob-lem caused by the steep decline in tax revenues.

State Rep. John Stewart (R-Plymouth) called Granholm's move "posturing" in an effort to motivate the Legislature to delay planned reductions in the small busi-ness tax and the personal income tax.

The economy is expected to begin its recovery this spring, which means tax receipts will start to grow, Stewart said. "If we put a pause on the reduction in the single business tax and personal income tax, we can come up with a balanced budget."

The foundation grant cuts will have a major impact on all of our school districts, which have already budgeted for the year based on expected state funding.

Wayne-Westland Supt. Greg Baracy, whose district could lose \$990,000 in state aid, was especially critical of the decision.

"It's only become a crisis for the school districts because the state is shifting its problem to us," Baracy said. "We honored our commitment to be prudent and turn districts around and they have to adopt a philosophy to honor their commitment to us."

Granholm has said that school districts could absorb cuts in state funding if they "tighten their belts." Many districts already find themselves strapped to maintain necessary programs and are beginning to assess the damage of cutting state funding in the middle of a school year. It is now time for the governor and the Legislature to bite the bullet and delay the planned tax reductions and restore foundation grant funding. Our future is in our schools.

#### **Animal crueity**

Animal cruelty

Animal abuse is a crime punishable by law in all 50 states. Intentional cruelty to animals is generally not an Isolated incident. Studies conducted during the last 25 years have substantiated the connection between violent behavior directed toward animals and violent crimes against humans and property.

The FBI began documenting the connection in the late 1970s by questioning convicted multiple murderers about their animal abuse histories. Almost half admitted to torturing and killing animals as adolescents.

A recent Massachusetts study tracked the criminal records of intentional animal abusers and compared them to a control group. It concluded that the people who intentionally abused animals were five times more likely to commit violent crimes against people, four times more likely to commit property crimes and three times more like to have a record for drug or disorderly conduct offenses.
