Sealed proposals will be received by the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan at the Clerk's office at 31555 Eleven Mile Road until 10:00 a.m. Monday, February 24, 2003, at which time and place all proposals will be publicly opened and read aloud.

This project consists of approximately one-half (1/2) mile of mainline enclosed storm drain construction, plus appurtenances. Primarily, the work is located along the north side of Nine Mile Road, between the intersection of Shawanee Road/Nine Mile Road, and Cora Street/Nine Mile Road, in Sections 26 and 35 of the City. Proposals must be submitted on proposal forms furnished by the City of Farmington Hills. Each proposal shall be accompanied by a Certified Check or Bid Bond by a recognized surety company in the amount of five percent (5%) of the bid, payable to the City of Farmington Hills, as security for acceptance of the Contract. This construction project is funded by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The work must be performed in accordance with the Davis Bacon Act, the Equal Employment Opportunity Act, Executive Order No. 11246, Section 2 Affirmative Action Plan, Section 202, all United States Department of Labor Regulations and Standards, Title 29, 1, 2, 3, and 5, and Title 18 E.O.C. Section 874, known as the "Anti-Kickback Act" and the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970. The Contractor shall comply with the updated EEO Bid Conditions as outlined in the Federal Regulation Index. No less than the prevailing salaries and wages set out in the Prevailing Wage Determination must be paid on this Project. The Contractor must also ensure that employees and applicants for employment are not discriminated against because of their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. This project will be phased consisting of the Base Bid, an Alternate A and an Alternate B.
