

CC sends two skiers to state

Redford-Detroit Catholic Central had two individual state qualifiers in the boys regional-ski meet Thursday at Mount Brighton.

Senior Pat Repasky placed third in the slalom and sixth in the giant slalom, and senior Che Martinez finished 10th in the slalom.

The top four skiers not affiliated with one of the three qualifying teams are additional qualifiers.

As a team, CC was fifth in the regional. West Bloomfield had 96 points, Milford 142, Walled Lake Central 147, White Lake Lakeview 166 and CC 203.

Mount Brighton Interscholastic Ski Association champion Brighton was sixth and failed to qualify for the state finals.

"I know they wanted to do a little better but, overall, they skied about where they should have been," CC coach Tom Gable said of the Shamrocks.

"They're a very competitive group. They trained hard all

season, and they gave it their best shot."

Repasky rebounded from a disappointing performance in the league meet a week earlier to have an outstanding regional. He was clocked at 31.90 in the slalom and 26.92 in the GS.

"Pat should be real happy with his finishes," Gable said. "I looked him square in the eyes

Gable added Repasky has renewed confidence going into the state meet now.

"Third place from this region is a good indicator," he said. "Our slalom skiers from Mount Brighton very often carry that momentum into something up north."

Martinez was 10th (33.39) in the slalom, Eric Kasprovicz 39th (38.09), Craig Camden 50th (41.69), Nick Barilovich 55th (42.72) and Brandon Guadoni 74th (50.33).

In the GS, Martinez was 17th (27.68), Camden 38th (29.81), Kasprovicz 40th (29.60), Eric Cicilian 42nd (29.76) and Barilovich 83rd (36.94).

"It's the slalom performance right where he should be," Gable said. "Today he put in a couple good slalom runs. He's a smaller fellow in stature, and that gave him a slower time in GS with the heavy wind conditions."

Called Lake Central's Austin Maxey was the slalom race (31.43), and South Lyon's John Thompson took first place in giant slalom (26.37).

"The first game was the killer," Perrin said. "When we got a decent pass on the serve, we won the point."

"We had a real difficult time serve-receiving. Once we got a good pass, the rally was over. The problem was we couldn't get that good pass."
