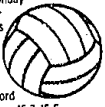

### Hawk JVs do well

Farmington Harrison's junior varsity volleyball team concluded a successful season Monday by winning its final dual match at Waterford Kettering, 15-2, 15-5.



The Hawks won the Oakland Activities Association Division III championship with a 12-0 record and ended the season 34-1 overall. Harrison's only loss was the perennial volleyball power Temperance Bedford in the final of the West Bloomfield tournament. The Hawks won every other tournament in which they competed - the Harrison, Walled Lake Central, Midwest Volleyball Productions and city tournaments.

In the city tournament Saturday, Harrison defeated Farmington (15-9, 15-0), North Farmington (15-8, 15-2) and Farmington Hills Mercy (15-3, 9-15, 15-10).

There will be a developmental camp for players just entering competitive play, a competitive camp for players with match experience and a tournament camp for high school varsity and tournament players.



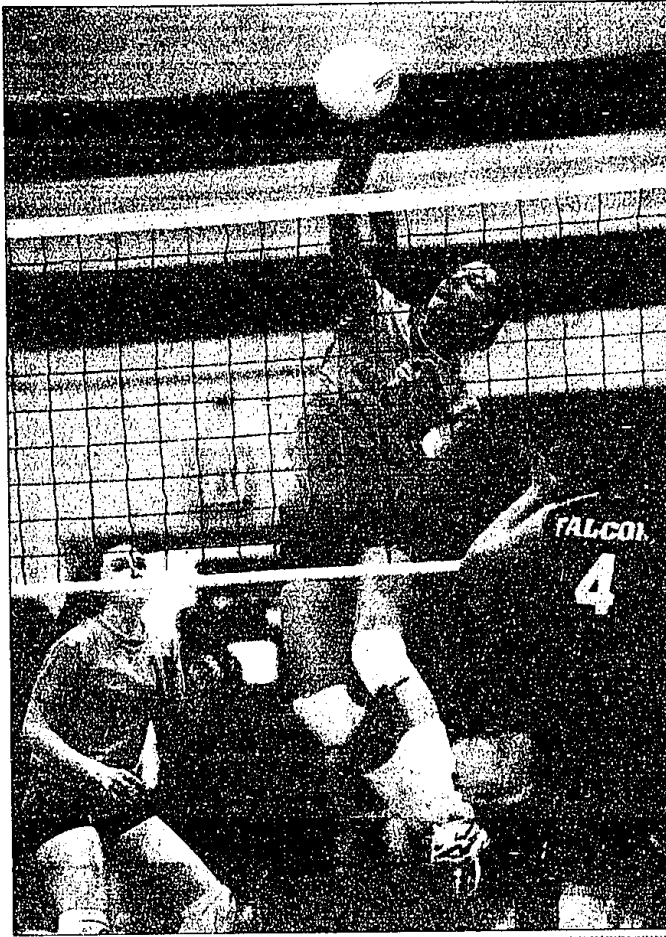

## Mercy repeats as city champ

Farmington Hills Mercy's one-two combination of seniors Anne Roosevelt and Tessa Kuykendall was more than the opposition could handle Saturday.

Behind the play of those two veterans, the Marlins were repeat winners in the second annual Farmington city tournament at Harrison High School.

Mercy, which conceded an average of just five-plus points per game, defeated North Farmington (15-9, 15-3), Farmington (15-8, 15-5) and Harrison (15-5, 15-1).

Roosevelt, a 5-foot-9 outside hitter, was named the most valuable player in the tournament on offense, and Kuykendall, a 6-foot-3 middle blocker, was voted the defensive MVP.

"Our left front played really well," Mercy coach Ed Ruhl said. "Sara Larson, Meredith Doyle and Anne did a good job all day."

"The setters picked the right ones to set, and the passers supported them. We kinda put the whole package together."

"Tessa was blocking everything. She has to be worth at least two or three points (every game) when they don't have an answer for her."

Kuykendall and Roosevelt made the all-tournament team again, as did Farmington senior front-court players Jessica Janowicz and Deanna Gauer. They were joined on the first team by Harrison senior middle hitter Maggie Condeni and Larson, a junior outside hitter.

The all-tournament second team consisted of Mercy's Chloe Kraft, Harrison's Jamila Fair and Jessica Condeni, Farmington's Melissa Patterson and North's Lindsey Lawley and Alina Rinke.

Harrison, the No. 2 seed, finished where expected by beating public-school rivals Farmington (15-7, 15-9) and North (15-13, 15-11).

Farmington defeated North (15-6, 15-6) to finish in third place. Gauer had 12 kills and a .430 hitting percentage, two solo blocks and four assist blocks.

Janowicz pounded 10 kills, served 6 aces and made three digs. Patterson had nine kills, two block assists and seven digs. Lisa Hellebuyck had 36 kill assists, three kills and four digs, and Britney Coleman con-

Farmington Harrison earned its first Oakland Activities Association victory in boys basketball Tuesday by winning at Royal Oak Kimball, 55-50.

The Hawks are 1-10 in Division III and 2-15 overall. Their only previous win was against Livonia Churchhill in non-league play. The Knights slipped to 6-5 and 9-8.

Kimball led at halftime, 33-29, but Harrison went on a 12-3 run in the first three minutes of the second half and outscored Kimball in the third quarter, 16-11.

The score was tied at 44 going into the final period, and the Hawks also were five points better over the last eight minutes, 11-6.

Stefan Burbridge had 17 points and 10 rebounds to lead Harrison, which only missed 15 field goals and shot 60 percent from the floor (22-of-37).

The Hawks, who made seven of 11 shots in the third quarter, were 5-of-12 shooting threes and 6-of-11 shooting free throws.

Harrison's Brandor Giles had 16 points and four assists, Andy Wingert eight points and four rebounds, Dan Williams six

points and DeAnte Thompkins five assists. Six-foot-5 senior center Mike Sheldon led the Knights with 15 points, A.J. Louis tossed in 12 and Matt Serafin eight.

## Flyers achieve 23rd consecutive win

Farmington Unified moved within one game of a perfect regular season in high school hockey Saturday night.

The undefeated Flyers upped their record to 23-0 with a 3-1 victory over visiting Clarkston at Farmington Hills Ice Arena.

Farmington capitalized on its power-play opportunities to score its first two goals.
