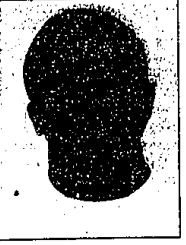

Jason Massoglia, senior, Athens: Massoglia was a three-year starter who led the Red Hawks with 15 points and eight rebounds per game despite playing point guard. The 6-foot-3 standout and team captain also led Athens with 45 steals, 67 assists and 17 blocks. Massoglia excels in the classroom and has a 3.9 GPA. "Jason was playing out of position at point guard, but he would do anything for the good of the team," coach Bill Gerbe said. "He would've had a better

year if he hadn't broken his wrist (shooting hand) during soccer season. He is a coach's dream." Ed Richardson, senior, West Bloomfield: Richardson was a force in the middle for the Lakers and is one of their all-time best rebounders and shot blockers, according to Moore. He was the team's leading rebounder the last two years and was second in scoring this year. Richardson averaged double figures in both categories. He also has a 3.9 GPA. "Ed is 6-3 but plays 6-8 because of his great jumping ability," Moore said. "He's a very emotional and intense player, a

team captain and great leader on and off the court. "In tight games, you can always count on Ed to come through. He's a tremendous talent." David Holston, junior, Avondale: Holston's role changed this year, giving him greater responsibility, and he adapted well to the challenge. The 5-9 guard was the sixth man on last year's Class B state championship team, but he had a bigger role to play this year. "He went from coming off the bench and being a sparkplug to being a marked man," coach Tim Morton said. "It was quite a role change for him. I thought

Chris Johnston, junior, Clarkston: Johnston led a young Clarkston team to a share of the OAA Division I championship, a Class A quarterfinal appearance and a 17-9 record. The 6-foot-6 center led the Wolves in scoring and rebounding with 16 points and close to 10 rebounds per game. "He can probably score in more ways than any player I've ever coached," Clarkston's Dan

Fife said. "He can score inside and he's a better shooter than he knows from outside. He's a good free-throw shooter, too." "He really came on at the end of the year, and he became a difficult player for other teams to guard. That made everybody else better on the outside."
