# Zoning Board of Appeals grants NFHS theater garage sale planned variance to banquet facility

The Farmington Hills Manor along Orchard Lake Road is expected to offer a portion of its building for restaurant patrons, while it maintains its anguet facility operation. The Farmington Hills Zoning Board of Appeals, in a 4-2 vote last month, approved a use variation request for owner Wilson Kassab, to use a smaller barquet room as a restaurant, with a portion of the larger room for overflow patrons.

and Betty Cook voted against
the proposed change, which
will be allowed for up to three
years and provides that a portion of the Manor can be open
from noon to 2 n.m. seven days

a week.

In February 2002, the Hills
City Council denied a rezoning
request to allow Kassab to
serve lunch at the facility.
At the time, council mem-

bers said if they changed the zoning from Office to B-3 general business and Kassab left, a new developer could put up anything from a drive-through restaurant to an auto repair shop.

Considering the land abuts homes, council members argued granting the request would amount to "spot zoning."

Council members urged Kassab to seek a variance at the time.

In the past year, Kassab has also made a request to the Planning Commission to expand the Manor by another 14,399 square feet to accommodate a restaurant and cateriar business.

The request was denied, because the plan failed to meet requirements and didn't include enough parking spaces. Kassab could not be reached for comment this week.
His architect Robert Allen said this week there is no set time when restaurant services will start, and a plan to expand

the facility is shelved for now. Allen also said the facility's interior is not expected to change to serve restaurant

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In the property of the property of the meting wherein the request was approved. ZBA member Mantley said he perceived the proposed use would be not so much a restaurant but a bar.

He stated it would be best to start with a smaller bar area and after the restaurant were to be run successfully, the proponent could return asking for additional space.

Member Cook stated hardship conditions for the request were not met. She said the land is not zoned for such use because it abute homes and a nearby school.

In 1995, Kassab was granted a use variance to open a banquet facility even though the property was not zoned for such use.

The building was formally owned and used by the Elks Club.

It will be held in the cafete-ria of the high school located at 32900 W. 13 Mile Road in

Farmington Hills.
