asm for creating unique ways to share their faith has resulted in a number of ambitious undertakings.

Salem's youth have established a coffee house on the second Friday of every month for local teens. It's attracted kids who aren't church members as well, like Farmington High student Rob Escott, who's playing Simon in the production, which chronicles the last seven days in the life of Jesus Christ.

"I always wanted to be in a musical," he said after running through a number for Feramp Saturday morning. "Farmington High does a musical, but it's at the same time and wrestling season."

A few weeks ago, a friend asked him to try out for the role. Escott hadn't seen the movie based on the Broadway show, which premiered in 1971—more than 15 years before he was born.

The movie came out a few years later, around the time of Salem UCC's 100th anniversary. The church was founded in 1875.

Nickels said about 120 people attend services on any given weekend. From this fairly small pool, youth choir members and adults have joined the cast and chorus. Her son, Matthew, a senior at Farmington High, is part of the props crew. He's responsible for a massive cross that will provide part of the performance's backdrop.

Nickels said the crucifixion scene may be a little intense for younger viewers.

"It's a reality check when you see him up on the cross," Nickels said. "You know it happened, but seeing it is different."

The role of Jesus is played by Dylan Lindgren, an 18-year-old Franklin Road Christian School student. His last role, interestingly, was that of Scrooge in his school's production of A Christmas Carol.

He particularly enjoys the aspect of community outreach.

Lindgren also participates in youth mission trips. He just returned from

India and has visited Guatemala, working in orphanages, market places and with the local churches.

As part of Teen Serve, he packs his clothes in carry-on luggage and uses two suitcases to carry toys, clothes and other supplies for the needy. He also

works in the U.S., spending a week in communities to help restore and repair homes, along with hundreds of teenagers from across the country.

Also part of the mission programs is Rachel Tripp, 15, a Farmington High student. One of her duties is costuming the Superstar production.

"We're planning on making it a current commentary," she said. "The disciples will be dressed as punks, and the crowd more as corporate America types, just to kind of show the contrast and how their faith was considered revolutionary at the time."

Tripp, who is a junior drum major and senator on the FHIS student council, said the church has a very strong sense of family and many great programs.

"We really want to get in touch with the community and share our faith," she said. She also appreciates being part of an event that shows the positive side of youth.

"Teenagers get kind of a bad reputation," she said. "I really like to try to get out and show people we do positive things, too."

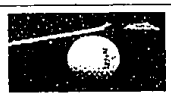
