#### SUSPICIOUS OF MURDER

Officers Investigating the Death of Man Whose Body Was Found Near Redford

The body of Charles Winters which was found on the floor of Ed. Prindle's barn one day last week is still in the Wayne morgue and the inquest which had been adjourned to Tuesday evening of this week was further adjourned to next Tuesday. When found the body bore marks of violence, the head and face being bruised and one arm was broken. Winters was known about the country hereabouts as he had worked in the various villages in this section, including Redford. He was a drinking man and had been on a protracted spree, so it is alleged just previous to the time that his dead body was found. An investigation by the authorities is in progress and the evidence will be produced at the coming inquest.

The circumstances lead the authorities to believe that it may be a case of murder and the investigation by Justice A. L. Lam phere and the sheriff's force is along that line.
