State Democrats, including State Rep. Aldo Vagnozzi (D-Farmington Hills), are trying to recruit public support in a campaign that 'be being billed as a war against the pharmaceutical industry.

Senior citizens - some of whom have to decide between food and needed prescriptions with their limited income - continue to beg lawmakers for help in dealing with their ever-escalating prescription drug and health insurance bills. At a town hall meeting in Southfield Wednesday, State Rep. Paul Condino called their struggle the state's and nation's most important domestic issue. About a dozen seniors attended Monday's meeting.

This is not only an attempt to reduce costs for seniors, but this in a serious attack on the pharmaceutical industry—the most profitable industry in the world, said Condino. a former Southfield city councilman.

Condino and colleague Vagnozzi met with focal seniors at the Southfield Civic Center on Monday to pitch Vagnozzi's plan to combine all of Michigan's and the Midwest's prescription purchases and direct them to Canada where these drugs are as much as 50 percent less.
Even if such a law was approved the state legislature, the lawmakers acknowledged there are other possible bureaucratic struggless. They would have to see if the law meets Federal Drug Administration laws that regulate cross-border trade. Also, some U.S. drug companies may boyent shipping products to Canada to circumvent such a law.

from \$300 to \$1,500, and his prescription drug co-pay for brand name drugs has elimbed from \$10 to \$20 cach.

"I'm in the middle of a drug cost dilemma, and I have it better than many other seniors I know," Ray said. "I have a health insurance policy from my former employer, but they keep chipping away at it each year."

State government, Condino said, must find a way to help the estimated 1.4 million Michiganders who have little or no insurance estimance to pay for needed prescription drugs that cost 'unconscionable' rates.

We believe there is something we can do,' Condino said. "This is about people's lives, yet there is no compassion or wherewithal by the pharmaceutical industry to come up with more fair pricing."

Condino and Vagnozzi said their efforts to find prescription drug relief will go beyond Lansing. They plan to lobby federal 'awmakers in Washington with their ideas.




