Magni has been coaching track since 1968, when he was a sophomore at University of Detroit. But his roots go deeper than that - back to his days as a student at Detroit St. Anthony (now East Catholic), where he was taught by three other Hall of Famers - Lou Miramonti, former Shrine athletic director, legendary East Catholic basketball coach Dave Soules and current Harper Woods Regina athletic director and girls basketball coach Diane Laffey.

And while he's helped hundreds of runners at CC over the years, producing four state team titles, two runner-up finishes, 17 CHSL titles and a slew of all-state runners, it's the other things that made him an easy choice for the award.
"He and a couple of other coaches run our league meet," said Rashid. "We don't have the resources to do it, so we rely on him a great deal. He's the clerk for our C-D championship. He doesn't have to do it; he could be indifferent about it, but he's not. Things like that are why he's successful."
Magni admits he was floored by the honor, but was grateful to win the award - especially because it was named after Lauer.
"Diene was my Spanish teacher and she flunked me. She'd write on my papers 'Spanish is not Italian, F! I've never let her forget it.' While at U-D, Magni was hired by Lauer as his replacement - leading St. Paul to a pair of sixth-place finishes at the state meet, before the school closed in 1970. After that, Magni got a job teaching at Orchard Lake Our Lady of Refuge and coaching at Orchard Lake St. Mary's.
"I was one of the only coaches in the state who had an interpreter," said Magni, clarifying that an interpreter was needed not because of him, but because of the students. "In those days, a lot of the kids came right from Poland, so the seminary students would have to translate for me."
In 1973, Magni moved to CC where he became the cross country coach and an assis-

Minutes were approved and/or received and filed.
Council approved a request for a temporary sign at Anna's Cafe & Bakery, 25922 Farmington Road, and directed the City Attorney and Administration to develop an agreement regarding the request for outdoor seating.

Hawks blast Colts
The bats were humming for the Harrison Hawks last week, as they recorded a trio of big wins over OAA Division I rivals.
Thursday, Harrison defeated Troy 13-9 in an eight-inning marathon.
The second game of the scheduled doubleheader was called due to darkness with Harrison sporting a 10-2 advantage. The game will be completed only if it has an impact on who finishes first in the league. Harrison is now 13-3 overall and 5-2 in the OAA I.
Danny Doig and Dan Williams each had three hits and 3 RBI for Harrison in the opener against the Colts. Williams doubled twice and scored three times.
Jake Ghannam added two hits and his bases-loaded double in the eighth inning broke the 9-9 tie and proved to be the difference-making hit in the game.
Kevin Zerbo added a two-run home run in the fifth inning, while Andy Wingert and Mike Sacha also drove in a pair of runs.
Wingert was the winning pitcher, getting through seven innings of work, allowing four earned runs with seven strikeouts and five walks allowed.
In the incomplete game, Zerbo had a grand slam home run to help the Hawks to their huge early lead. Doig and Ghannam each drove in a pair of runs also.
Wednesday, the pitching of Eric Zatkun proved to be the difference in a 4-1 win over the Rochester Adams Highlanders. He pitched 5 2/3 innings, allowing just one hit (coming in the first inning) with four Ks and no earned runs allowed.
Greg Hocking had a pair of hits in the win over Adams, while Zerbo also picked up two hits and Doig delivered a two-run single in the bottom of the sixth.
Harrison travels to West Bloomfield Monday for another tough league contest.

THE PROPERTY TAX MILLAGE RATE PROPOSED TO BE LEVIED TO SUPPORT THE PROPOSED BUDGET WILL BE A SUBJECT OF THIS HEARING!
The 2003 proposed property tax levy includes a 11.460 mills (\$11.460 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for city operations and charter limited debt service; 2.000 mills (\$2.000 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for unlimited debt service; 1.5563 (\$1.5563 per \$1,000 of taxable Value) for road improvements, for a total millage rate of \$15.1163 (\$15.1163 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value.)
The Farmington Downtown Development Authority proposes to levy 1.9705 (\$1.9705 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) of property in the Downtown Development District.
