

Special Olympics honors local volunteer

David Cattermole had spent years focusing on himself and his education, and when he left college, he wanted to give something back.

After a decade and a half of service, Cattermole has been honored for the countless hours he's devoted to the organization he chose back then: Special Olympics.

Named Oakland County's Special Olympics Volunteer of the Year, he will be recognized at a banquet on Wednesday, May 28 in Mount Pleasant with 38 other outstanding volunteers from around the state of Michigan.

"Working with Special Olympics is so rewarding, I often feel I'm indebted to them

for letting me be a part of it," he said as he accepted a certificate of appreciation from Farmington Mayor Jim Mitchell at Monday's City Council meeting.

Cattermole started out helping with a bowling competition. With each new experience, he found himself wanting to get more involved. Eventually, he called the Oakland County director to find out what else he could do.

"They were looking for a golf coach in Farmington," he said. "Through that I got to know a lot of people."

Over the years, Cattermole has served in various volunteer roles - event director for the stunning Long Jump at the Track and Field games, the Oakland County Bowling competition, Oakland County

Swimming and Powerlifting Competition and the Special Olympics. He still coaches for Team Farmington Golf Team every Monday night, and in the winter, he coaches the Team Farmington Snow Boarding Team on Sunday afternoons.

"I'd never snowboarded in my life," he said with a smile. "I was learning as the kids were learning."

Cattermole is an Electrical Engineer for Computer, Inc., in Troy. No matter what kind of day he's having, he said, when he arrives at a special Olympics event and sees how positive the athletes are, it lifts his spirits.

"I get more from Special Olympics than I give."

Vogelheim to host painting workshop

Award-winning artist Donna Vogelheim is conducting a two-day workshop in Heritage Park on Friday and Saturday, May 30 and 31, 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The classes will take place in the stables studio at Heritage Park, located on Farmington Road just south of Eleven Mile Road on Friday and Saturday.

Vogelheim was named the 1991 Farmington Artist in Residence. She earned her Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Michigan and has traveled all over

Michigan, Ohio, Canada and other states conducting numerous lectures and demonstrations to various art societies.

The workshop is for all levels of painters, from the beginning novice to the more expert. The watercolor workshop will focus on how to paint compositionally sound landscapes. Each day includes a short lecture on the principles of arranging shapes for good design. Students will also learn how to mix a range of greens,

from cool to warm.

Vogelheim will demonstrate and illustrate her techniques for creating beautiful watercolor landscapes. Class size is limited to ensure students receive plenty of individual attention.
