Harrison High School Senior Troy Brown carned second place in the Michigan and Indiana Division of Physics Bowl. "Last month, 13 advanced placement Physics Bowl exam long with thousands of other students from across the nation," said Steve Dail, a Harrison High science and

physics teacher.

The exam is sponsored by the American Association of Physics Teachers and it consists of 40 multiple choice

"It is a tough exam," Dail said. "The median score was a 16.8. Troy's score of 27 was good enough to take second over all other students taking the exam in Michigan and Indiana. Other good scores were obtained by Jordan Steckloff (26) and
