AT HOME AND ABROAD

Washington.

Dr. F. L. Dunlap of the department of agriculture, bureau of chemistry, who was the chief accuser of Dr. Harvey W. Wiley in the controversy which broke the department of agriculture, has resigned his position. He has accepted a place with a chemical concern in Chicago.

Secretary of the Navy Meyer denied that he had decided to resign from the cabinet on account of ill health, as was reported. "There is absolutely no truth in this rumor," he said. "I am not to leave the cabinet. My health is very much improved."

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson has arranged to hold hearings on the white blight of cotton at the Mediterranean fair September 18, and the potato wart September 20, preliminary to proposed sweeping quarantine provisions against these agricultural menaces.

The assault upon Dr. Luis Lazo Ariza, former Honduran minister to Washington, at Guatemala City, recently, was purely personal, one reports Senator Menendez, Guatemalan minister, who called at the state department in Washington and said he had a telegram from his government that the assault was committed by Lazo's own servant.

Theodore Roosevelt is expected to appear October 2 or 3 before the special committee investigating campaign contributions, to testify regarding the allegations of John D. Archbold and Senator Penrose that the Standard Oil company gave \$100,000 to the Republican national committee of 1904 with his approval.

Domestic

The United Spanish War Veterans met in Atlantic City for their annual encampment.

Miss Edith Norton, thirty-five years old, daughter of a wealthy Lehigh (Ill.) farmer, was killed by a shotgun, and her head off with a shot.

Nicholas Jedrick was shot and killed at Fulton, Ky., by Roy Darden, because of the chastisement of Darden by Jedrick because of an insulting remark said to have been made by Darden to Jedrick's sister. Six bullets entered Jedrick's body. Darden was arrested.

More than four thousand horses have died in western Kansas since a mysterious disease broke out in that section of the state, and it is estimated that the money loss is around half a million dollars. The great mortality has created a serious situation, hundreds of farmers being left without the animals, so necessary farm work in the fields.

Oscar F. Nelson of Chicago was re-elected president and Indianapolis was selected as the next meeting place of the National Federation of Postoffice Clerks, in session at Salt Lake City.

According to a police announcement, a glare entered a hot store on Broadway, New York, between Saturday and Tuesday, and stole \$5,000 imported Austrian velvet hats, valued at \$30,000.

A vein of high grade bituminous coal has been found on the spot where the United States government, building stood at the world's fair in St. Louis, and is being mined by the city's use.

Joseph Drago, an employe on John D. Rockefeller's estate at Pocahontas, N. Y., was apprehended by a member of the "Black Hand," society, who demanded \$300 from him. Drago refused to pay and a pistol shot took place. The "Black Hand" agent was shot in the leg and escaped.

In 1890, when Kansas was passing through unusually hard times, the government census figures showed that 65 per cent of Kansas farmers were mortgaged. According to the census figures for 1910 only 44.3 per cent are mortgaged.

About 3,000 kosher butcher shops are closed in New York as the result of a general strike of the union butchers. The strikers demand a 50 per cent increase in wages, a 15-hour day and recognition of their union.

Snow fell in the mountains west of Carson City, Nev., covering the range to a depth of several inches. This is the earliest snowfall in twenty-five years.

Fire in a steamer trunk cost the life of Patrick J. Kelly, chief of the Holyoke (Mass.) fire department. Kelly was riding to the fire in an automobile when a hose wagon struck his machine.

Suffering from a severe fracture of the skull, the bandit who, single-handed, robbed the New York Limited train on the Louisville & Nashville railroad twelve miles east of New Orleans Wednesday night, later, to be killed by the locomotive driver, was brought to New Orleans and placed in the charity hospital.

After entering the house of his prospective father-in-law, German congressman, and it is charged, stealing \$2,000 worth of diamonds and jewelry, A. S. Brusse, twenty-seven years old, said to be of a wealthy family in Milwaukee, was arrested at Milwaukee.

More than 600 students at Columbia university worked their way through college last year, earning \$450,000, according to the report of the committee on employment.

Private detectives who have been keeping a close watch over the John D. Rockefeller Jr. Rockefeller estate in Hills were equipped with a squad of watchdogs which will assist them in pursuing Italian bandits who have been responsible for recent holdups and petty crimes in the state.

Specialists in the raising of vegetables from all parts of the country are in Rochester, N. Y., in attendance at the fifth annual convention of the Vegetable Growers' association of America.

Unless the supreme court stays the order of a lower court the household goods of Gen. Daniel B. Egan, veteran of many battles of the Civil war, will be sold at auction to satisfy a judgment for \$8,056 in favor of the Lincoln Trust company of New York.

The judgment is based on a promissory note given by the aged soldier.

Miss Annie Dorothy Nixon, twenty-two years old, the daughter of Richard B. Nixon, financial clerk of the United States senate, was dropped at Colonial Beach, Va., in a vain attempt to rescue her swimming companion, Franklin W. Wiseman, aged twenty, of Havana, Ill.

Politics
The Roosevelt presidential election cannot be taken off the Republican general election ballot in the November election in Kansas. This was the ruling of the state supreme court in the case of the United States circuit court of appeals.

Oscar B. Strauss, former secretary of commerce and labor in the cabinet of President Roosevelt, and once United States minister to Turkey, was unanimously acclaimed the nominee for governor of the Progressive party in New York state at the convention held in Syracuse.

Political bosses and machines, crooked business and unenforced legislation are condemned in the platform which was adopted by the Ohio progressive convention at Columbus. Arthur Garfield Hays was nominated for governor of Ohio by the convention by acclamation.

With John L. Stevens of Boone as their nominee for governor, Iowa Progressives in convention at Des Moines put a third party state ticket into the field, after overcoming opposition to the plan by a vote of nearly five to one.

Foreign
Thirty-seven coal miners were killed by an explosion of fire damp in the Clarence coal mine, near Brany, France, in the department of Nord.

Personal
Rev. William White, Wilson, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, chaplain of the First regiment, Illinois National Guard, and one of the best known divines in the country, was killed when he was struck by a street car at a crossing. Rev. Wilson was on his way to a meeting of the Masonic order, of which he was a prominent member.

Charles W. Morse, the banker sentenced to a long term in the Atlanta penitentiary and pardoned by President Taft because of poor health, returned to his old stamping grounds, 49 Exchange place, New York City, where he conducted offices on the nineteenth floor and prepared to get back, so he said, to his "life work."

Franklin Booth, the new head of the Salvation army, has issued an appeal for \$750,000 with which to erect, equip and maintain a training college for Salvation army officers as a memorial to his father.

Lieut. Gen. Arthur MacArthur, U. S. A., retired, former ranking general of the army, dropped dead in Milwaukee while addressing the last reunion of members of the regiment he commanded in the Philippine war. Death was due to apoplexy.

GOVERNOR JOHNSON TOURS MICHIGAN

ROOSEVELT'S RUNNING MATE STARTS MICHIGAN CAMPAIGN IN DETROIT—ENDS IN GRAND RAPIDS.

MET AT DEPOSIT AT VARIOUS STOPS IN GOODY CROWDS.

Declares Campaign of 'This Year to Be One of the Greatest Ever Held in the United States.

Nearly 8,000 people of Michigan today caught their first sight of Illinois W. Johnson, the "fighting governor" of California, and Bull Moose candidate for vice-president.

The conventional "run-and" special train tour of presidential campaigns was the means through which the nominees of the Southern Pacific gave his introduction to Michigan people and the brief speeches he made bore out the impression that he is a fighter; one of the cool, calm kind who is deliberately and dispassionately and mean very much what they say.

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The Grand Rapids meeting, where 8,000 persons heard him, was the effort of the day, and here he was greeted with the first demonstrative enthusiasm of the day although Kalamazoo was supposed to be his headquarters. At all stops his speeches were much the same and it was evident that he was carefully conserving his voice and nervous energy for the evening meeting. Direct attack on Taft and the Republican national convention was made only occasionally.

STATE WHEAT CROP POOR

Average Yield is Placed at Ten Bushels to Acre.

According to the secretary of state this season's wheat crop is the poorest since 1901.

The average estimated yield in the state is 18, southern counties, 9, central counties, 11, northern counties, 10, and in the peninsula 20 bushels per acre. One hundred mill, elevator and grain men report no wheat marketed in August.

The estimated average yield of oats in the state is 32, in the southern counties 33, in the central counties 34, and in the northern counties 35, and in the peninsula 40 bushels per acre.

The condition of corn, compared with an average per cent, is 75 in the state and 70 in the peninsula, 61 in the central counties, 71 in the northern counties, and 72 in the upper peninsula.

The condition of beans compared with an average per cent is 78 in the state.

The condition of potatoes compared with an average per cent is 88 in the state and northern counties, 81 in the southern counties, 78 in the central counties and 101 in the upper peninsula.

The condition of clover seed compared with an average per cent is 79 in the state.

Live stock throughout the state is reported in good condition.

Employers Get Under New Law.
During the first seven days of September, when the new law went into effect, Michigan employers of labor filed written notice with the state industrial accident board that they intended to comply with the new law. The law did not become operative until the first day of the present month, consequently no employer could legally file a notice before that date. Applications are still coming by every mail.

Seventeen hundred of the 2,303 looms in the Appleton, Mass., cotton mills are idle because of a strike of 300 weavers.

Charles L. Yates, publisher of the National Jurist and treasurer of the American Association of Nurses, is dead at his home in Rochester, N. Y., of heart failure, aged 55 years.

William Maffly, of New York, who in 1903 and 1904 was national secretary of the National party and also for several months part-associate editor of the Metropolitan magazine, is dead.
