Gadsby's autobiography offers insight to hockey

Fate wasn't always kind to Bill Gadsby as far as the hockey world was concerned.

The brainly star defenseman only missed scoring a Stanley Cup-winning goal by a goaltender's good fortune. He also was unjustly fired as Detroit Red Wings head coach after posting wins in the first two games of the 1969-70 season.

'That's the biggest shock of my life,' said Gadsby, a 35-year resident of Southfield. 'I never did find out why then-owner Bruce Norris canned him.

But Gadsby, 75, doesn't dwell on those downers. Hed rather focus on the many good things that have happened to him and his family during the years. There's a loving wife of 31 years (Edna), four daughters who all graduated from Southfield High School and nine grandchildren.
