ED WYNN, "THE PERFECT FOOL," COMING TO THE SHUBERT-DETROIT SOON

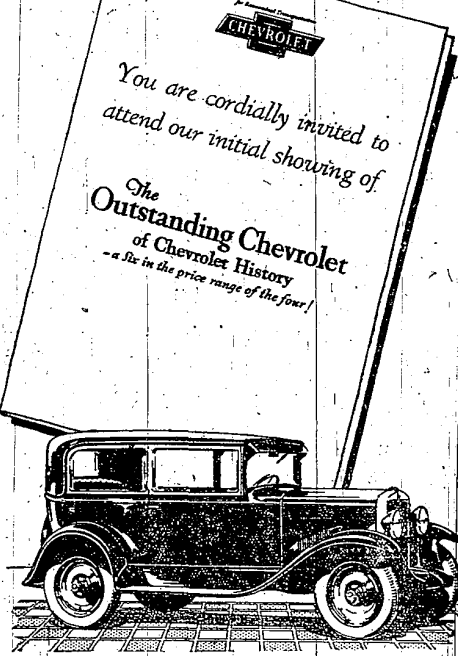
