FARMINGTON DEFEATS COOLEY HIGH OF DETROIT, 22-2

Farmington High School's basketball team redeemed themselves Tuesday night when they defeated Cooley High of Detroit 22 to 2 on the home floor. Most of the scoring was done in the first three periods. In the last period the reserves were put in. Cooley failed to score a field basket.

The first quarter was rather slow. D. Cox made one basket and one foul shot. The quarter ended 3 to 0 in Farmington's favor. The action in the second period was not much faster. Schweim and D. Cox each scored a basket. The half ended 7 to 0 still in Farmington's favor.

When the boys returned to the floor they took a 10-0 lead. Six baskets were made in quick succession. Schweim tallied three, I. Cox two, and D. Cox one. When the quarter ended the score stood 19 to 0 in Farmington's favor.

At the start of the last period D. Cox tallied another basket; then the reserves were put on the floor. Cooley, taking advantage of the change, tried hard to score. He managed to tally two free throws. Measell scored a foul shot.
