CONGRESS FROM WITHIN

Important to the diversified agriculture of Michigan is the pending revision of tariff rates levied on farm products of Canada and other foreign countries.

During January and February, general tariff hearings will be held on classes of products, the duties on which may be revised. The complete schedule is published below. My constituents are hereby requested to make known any suggestions or desires they may have along this line.

"Is there not some way in which Congress can stop the flow of farm products into our country from Canada and abroad?" writes one of the interested parties of the Sixth District. "An emergency tariff, high enough to protect our market, is needed for beans, which have been coming in in large quantities during the last year."

"Hay needs more protection as do all meat products, though I am inclined to think free stockers

and feeders would be a benefit all around. All dairy products, poultry and eggs, fruits and vegetables, together with many other farm products, have need of immediate protection."

No doubt there are many whose opinion coincides with that of the writer. In the plan to draft a new tariff bill, I have taken the position from the beginning and come here early for the purpose of urging that the Ways and Means Committee start these hearings and prepare a bill which might be reported at special session arranged this spring. I believe that is the only way the party can keep faith with the agricultural interests of the country.

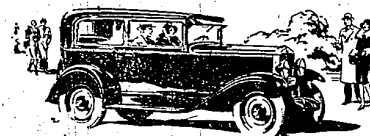
