PROCEEDS OF CHRISTMAS SEAL SALES FOR 1928

Proceeds from the Christmas seal sale of the Oakland County Tuberculosis Association have passed last year's entire fund and there are still 7,000 letters, each containing \$2 worth of the little stickers to be heard from, out of the 24,000 envelopes mailed this year. The total of the seal sale was near the \$9,500 mark today. Last year a total of \$9,413 was raised.

The quota this year is \$15,000 and with the 7,000 letters still to be heard from indications are that this year's higher quota will be reached. Added burdens of the association, brought on by increased population, a natural expansion of the tuberculosis clinics throughout the county and the

necessity of equipping a tract of land deeded free to the association for a children's fresh air camp caused the board of the association to set \$15,000 as the seal sale goal for 1929.

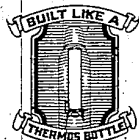
