torney Schulte in regard to the

distribution of the gas tax received

and filed.

Miss Hard, secretary of the Farmington Woman's Club, addressed the Commissioners urging a tax of 10 cents per thousand on the assessed valuation of the City for the benefit of the Library and asked that it be included in the next annual budget. Mrs. Irish also spoke in favor of the proposition.






