COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of the City Commissioners of Farmington, held February 4, 1929.

Called to order by Mayor Butterfield at 7:40 p. m.

Commissioners present, Staman, Gildemeister, Johnson, Bickling and Hogle.

Minutes of the meeting of January 24 read and approved.

A communication from the Farmington Woman's Club thanking the Commission for cleaning the snow off the sidewalks was received and filed.

Communication from City Attorney Schulte in regard to the distribution of the gas tax received and filed.

Miss Haru secretary of the Farmington Women's Club addressed the Commissioners urging a tax of 10 cents per thousand on the assessed valuation of the City for the needs of the Library and asked that it be included in the next annual budget. Mrs. Irish also spoke in favor of the proposition.

Motion made by Hogle, seconded by Gildemeister, that an appropriation of 10 cents per thousand on the assessed valuation of the City for the benefit of the Library be included in the 1929 Budget. Carried.

RESOLUTION

At a regular meeting of the City Commission of the City of Farmington, held the 4th day of February, 1929, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved: That the City Commission of the City of Farmington unanimously in meeting assembled protest against the proposal of the Governor to divert a substantial portion of the revenue from the license or the gasoline tax to the construction and repair of state buildings and that a copy of the resolution be forwarded to the Lieutenant Governor the Commanding officer of the Senate and to the speaker of the House of Representatives.
