"SCHOOLS ARE BEHIND TIMES"—SMITH

"Everything else is up to date, why not our schools?" was the subject of the talk by Professor M. L. Smith before the P. T. A. last Thursday. Professor Smith emphasized the lack of opportunity in rural schools and the advantages offered by the consolidated schools. He quoted examples of the modernness of industries and the antiquity of some of the schools. The speaker, a locomotive used, he said, was built after the Civil War, around 1879, while some schools he has seen in the north were built before the Civil War. That the school must progress, with the rest of the world, was stressed by him. Professor Smith is head of the Rural Department of Central State Teachers' College.

The rest of the program consisted of songs by the fifth grade and High School choruses, and several numbers rendered by the orchestra. Refreshments were served in the gym.

Residents of Farmington and the surrounding districts were invited to attend this meeting and their response was gratifying.
