Mrs. Fred Wilkinson was a visitor at the home of Mrs. William Brooks on Friday.

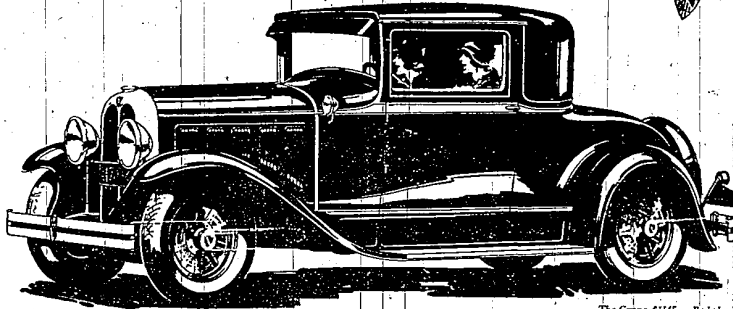
Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Straubel are now settled in their new home. Electric lights are being installed.
