Tests in Farmington include acceleration, brakes, and hill-climbing. The trials were made on Ten-Mile road and on McCee Hill.

In the brake-test, the Essex was

In the brake-test, the Essex was brought to a stop in 18 feet, ten inches, while travelling at 30 miles an hour. At 40 miles an hour, the was stopped in 30 feet, one inch.

Acceleration tests showed the Essex going from a standing start to 45 miles an hour in 14 and jone-fifth seconds. In an acceleration test for distance, the car went from a standing start and at 750 feet distance was travelling at 45 miles an hour.

The hill-climbing test was run over McGee Hill, and was made from a standing start. The car was travelling 24 miles per hour at the top of the short but steep grade.
