Adjourned.

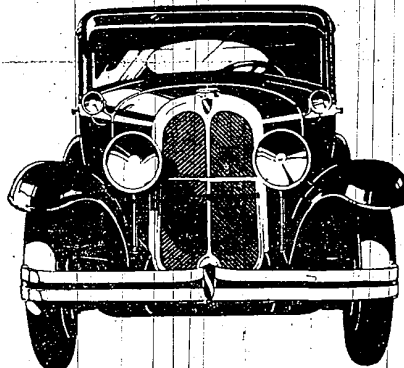
