FAMOUS NEWSPAPER PLAY
COMES TO THE WILSON

With a special cast, Jed Harris will present his New York and Chicago success "The Front Page" at the Wilson Theatre opening this coming Sunday night, March 31, for a limited run. Broadway and Chicago reviewers united in praising it as the most gorgeously funny and exciting play of the present season—in fact the only real dramatic "smash" of last autumn's crop. New Yorkers paid as high as ten dollars a seat to see "The Front Page" at the Time Square Theatre. With the road clamoring for the play, Mr. Harris organized another company headed by Roger Pryor and Fuller Melish, Jr., and this organization

will come to the theatregoers of Detroit next Sunday night.

Written by two former Chicago newspapermen, Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur, "The Front Page" is an uproarious and thrilling play of newspaper life, set in the pressroom of Chicago's criminal courts building. Hildy Johnson, a young Herald-Examiner reporter who has announced his retirement from the "game" to marry and join a New York advertising agency, has dropped in to say goodbye to the gang. Momentarily he is alone in the dimly lighted pressroom.

The fugitive killer who has been hiding on the roof, crawls through an open window and is promptly locked in a roltop desk while Johnson makes frantic efforts to deliver him to his managing editor, Walter Burns, and the "town" on the story.

His fiancée and her mother waiting for him at the depot, all thought of marriage disappear from Johnson's mind and there is a welter of excitement involving politicians, officials and racketeers.

Of course there is a wedding, but not before Johnson has been put through a grueling test and even the final curtain raises a doubt that he is able to remain on the train with his bride and prospective mother-in-law, after he has boarded it with them.

Roger Pryor, to be seen as Hildy Johnson, has been playing in "The Royal Family" in New York for the past year.

Others in this excellent Jed Harris cast are: Fuller Melish, Jr., Harlan Briggs, Robert Pitkin, John Carmody, Larry Light, Harry Wallace and Allan Fagan.

Although Mr. Hoover spent two months recently visiting the South Americans, many of the women folks complain their husbands won't take an evening to call on the neighbors.

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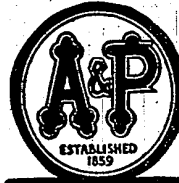

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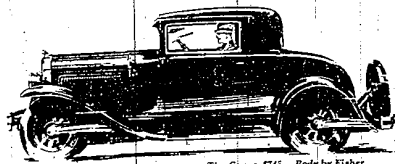
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
