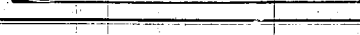

Commissioners present, Hogle, Gildemeister, Johnson, Staman and Bickling.

Minutes of the meeting of March 22 read and approved.

Moved by Hogle, seconded by Johnson, that the eight petitions of Stephen Tredway, George K. Checketts, Bernard C. Banfield, Carl Goers, Ralph J. Auten, Warren Henderson, Leo Gildemeister and Emory Hatton be accepted and placed on the ballot as candidates for election as City Commissioners for the full term. Carried.

Moved by Hogle, seconded by Johnson, that the names of Stephen Tredway, George K. Checketts, Bernard C. Banfield, Carl Goers, Ralph J. Auten, Warren Henderson, Leo Gildemeister, Emory Hatton and Amos Otis be accepted and placed on the ballots as candidates for Commissioners to fill vacancy. Carried.

After inspection and discussion of the petitions on file all of which were found to be in compliance with the law the Commission on motion of Staman, seconded by Hogle, named the following as candidates for the offices opposite their names.
