Mayor Lamb named Harold Oldenburg as Superintendent of Public Works and Harvey Blough as Assistant Superintendent of Public Works.

Moved by Hatton, seconded by Staman, that Harold Oldenburg be named Superintendent of Public Works at a salary of \$2400 a year for one year and Harvey Blough Assistant Superintendent at \$1500 a year for one year, with house rent, lights, heat and water.

Motion made to amend and substitute the name of William Maas for Harold Oldenburg at a salary of \$2,000 a year. Amendment lost.

The original motion was then voted upon and carried.

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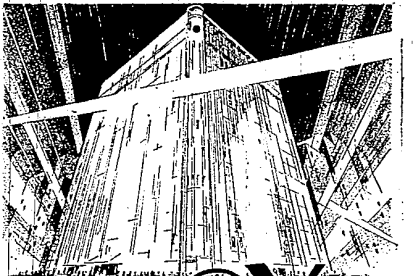
