First Letters Sealed With Odd Substances

Sealing a letter is nowadays the work of an instant. How was it accomplished before the invention of gummed envelopes?

The first seals consisted of a ring affixed to the letter and made of a mixture of pitch, wax and plaster.

The use of wax did not become general until the Middle Ages. Beeswax yellowed by time was the first variety of it used, and after then came sealing wax, mixed with a white substance. Red and green wax came in during the Twelfth century, and 100 years later the list of colors was supplemented by nearly all those now to be found in wax.

During the first empire the French began to use wafers brought from Italy by the soldiers of the French army. These wafers were cut with a punch from a thin leaf made of flour. Finally gummed envelopes began to replace the sealing wax and wafers.

The first of these envelopes were made in England about the year 1840.

Earth's Curvature

The geologist's survey says that in surveys of small tracts of land he does not take of the fact that the surface of the earth is spherical. The irregularities of the surface more than make up for the curvature. True north and south lines are not parallel, but get closer and closer together as they go north or south from the equator. For large areas the curvature of the earth is apparent. In the general land office surveys the curvature shows. The blocks of a square mile were made as nearly square as possible, the error from curvature being all thrown into the northwest corner of each six-mile block.

Bolivar Well Earned Title of "Liberator"

Simon Bolivar, who was born at Caracas, Venezuela, on July 24, 1773, has been called the "Liberator" in recognition of the heroic part he played as a valiant soldier and a wise statesman, in gaining the independence of Venezuela, New Granada and Bolivia.

He was a man of broad vision and liberal education. During a visit to Europe he was seized with the passion for freedom and resolved to devote his life to the liberation of South America from the yoke of Spain. In 1810 he became the first President of the republic of Colombia, and in 1824 was appointed dictator of the newly formed republic of North Peru, which was afterward known as Bolivar after his name.

Unable to control the warring factions and broken in health, he retired into private life and was preparing to leave the country when he died of fever, at San Pedro, near Santa Marta, on December 17, 1830.

Yell Relieves Dizziness

Attacks of sudden dizziness while flying in an airplane can sometimes be relieved by giving a loud, high-pitched yell, causing as little breath as possible, naval flight surgeons declare. This forces blood into the smaller veins in the region of the heart.

An aviator "yell" often causes the blood to leave the veins temporarily, resulting in a sensation of dizziness. During certain maneuvers at high speeds a decrease in blood supply to the brain may cause fainting, although the effects vary with the individual. Yelling contracts the abdominal muscles, the diaphragm and chest muscles, and the pressure forces more blood toward the heart.

figures for the first quarter of 1928 were 91,495. April will proceed with a schedule of 45,000 cars, it is announced.



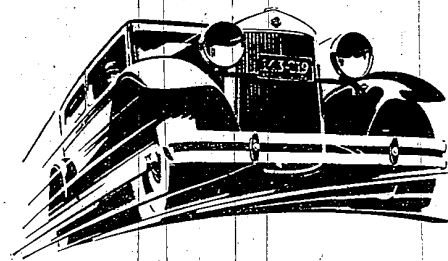
