

C. BRAVENDER, 73, PASSES AWAY AT PONTIAC HOSPITAL

Brother Of Farmington Acres
Resident Succumbs To Long
Illness

Christopher Bravender, 73, of Farmington Acres, passed away Tuesday, April 23, at a hospital in Pontiac. Mr. Bravender had been in ill health for several months.

Christopher Bravender was born in the village of Holland, Hurley County, Ontario, Canada, March 12, 1856. He has made his home in Farmington Acres with his sister, Miss Mary Bravender who survives, also a nephew Will Bravender of Sandwich, Ontario.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Hooley Funeral Home, Rev. E. W. Palmer of the Baptist Church officiated. Burial took place in Oakwood Cemetery.

Chevrolet Distributors Start Third Year Here

The announcement that the Chevrolet Motor Company had broken all records in motor car history by producing half a million six-cylinder cars within four months! was a happy coincidence for R. E. Messrs. Beckley and Nicholson came to Farmington in April 1927, after years of experience in the automobile accessory business. They took up quarters in a small frame structure, hardly larger than one of the cars they were selling, while Amos Ott was building their place of business. The little building was at the back of the lot and was no larger than buildings often used by contractors as tool-sheds.

The building which is now the home of Farmington Motor Sales was completed and formally opened to the public on September 1, 1927, about four months after it was started. The agency has been a very successful one, their first full year, 1928, having been a "banner year," and the first four months of 1929 showing a demand considerably ahead of deliveries.

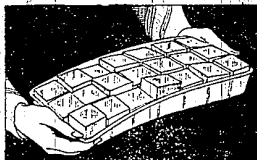
