

DEATH OF MRS. G. SIMMONS ENDS 52 WEDDED YEARS

Illness Of A Year Fatal To Life—Long Resident Of This Section

A married life of 52 years was broken last Friday night when death, came to Mrs. Hattie Moore Simmons, a life-long resident of this section. Mrs. Simmons passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. K. McCrumb of Pontiac.

The deceased was 71 years old. She was born in Vermont, and married George Simmons 52 years ago on April 17 last. Nearly all her life was spent in homes on

the Seven-Mile and Nine-Mile roads. Funeral services were held Monday, followed by burial in Livonia Center Cemetery. Rev. William Richards of Northville officiated. Pallbearers included Joseph Graham, Elmer A. Empson, James Eastman and Frank Bradley.

Surviving are the husband and six children, Mrs. Katie McCrumb of Pontiac; Mrs. Clara Allen of Pontiac; Mrs. Lillie Fritch of Detroit; Mrs. Robert Lee of Plymouth; Arthur Simmons of Detroit; and Claude Simmons of Six-Mile road.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

In a recent decision by the Supreme Court in the case of the Board of Education of the City of Lincoln Park vs. Board of Education of the City of Detroit, 245 Michigan on page 411, it was held that the City of Lincoln Park had the right to tax the portion of the school district annexed to the City of Detroit for their portion of the interest on bonds and the bonds themselves issued for the purchase of lands and the construction of school buildings.

The City of Detroit resisted Lincoln Park's demand for payment of interest which had accrued on the bonds and relied upon Act No. 265 of 1927 which the Supreme Court held void and unconstitutional for the reason that a contract relation existed between the City of Lincoln Park and the purchasers of the bonds, the purchasers having relied on the security afforded him and the right to enforce collection by a tax on the property of the district as it existed at the time the bonds were issued.

The Supreme Court further held that Act No. 265 violated section 10 of article 1 of the Federal constitution and section 9 of article 2 of our State constitution, both of which forbid the enactment of any law "impairing the obligation of contracts."

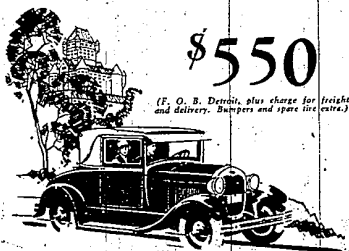
