Mrs. Margaret Davis, who has been ill, is greatly improved.

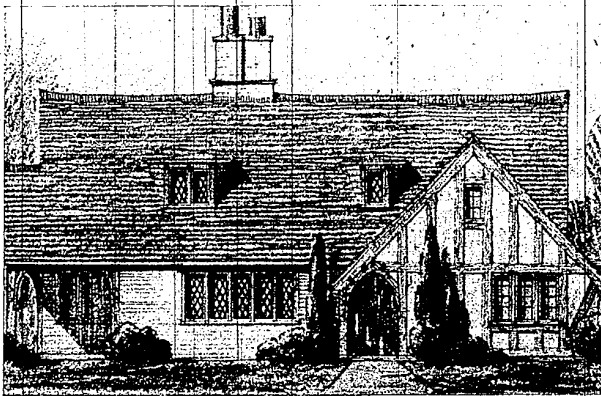

**CHECKETTS WILL SHOW MARQUETTE**

George K. Checketts, Farmington Buick dealer, will present to this community on Saturday, May 1 the new Marquette, Buick-built motor car, designed to place a Buick-built car within the reach of millions.

The Marquette will be on display at the showroom on Grand River avenue. It will afford the public its first glimpse of the new car, which sells for \$965 to \$1,035.

There are six models in the Marquette line, the two-door sedan, four-door sedan, business coupe, roadster and phaeton.

Under tests the car has consistently accelerated on a straight away from 5 to 25 miles per hour in 8.8 seconds; from 10 miles per hour to 25 miles per hour in 6.3 seconds; from 10 to 40 miles per hour in 13.4 seconds and from 10 to 60 miles per hour in 21 seconds.

At General Motors proving ground a five-passenger, four-door sedan carrying a total load

of 450 pounds was driven over a hill 1,500 feet long, one of the steepest on the proving grounds. The driver approached the grade at five miles per hour. As the hill was encountered the engine was accelerated and the car swept upward at rapidly increasing speed. As it crossed the summit the car was going 25 miles per hour and steadily picking up.
