LUTHERANS TO ATTEND TRIENNIAL CONVENTION

More than a thousand delegates, representing 1,100,000 members of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other states, will sit in session at Concordia Teachers' Seminary, River Forest, Ill., from June 19 to 29. Reports on the work for the past three years will be rendered and plans made for the coming triennial. Important decisions regarding educational matters and mission projects must be reached.

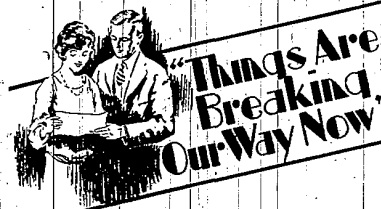

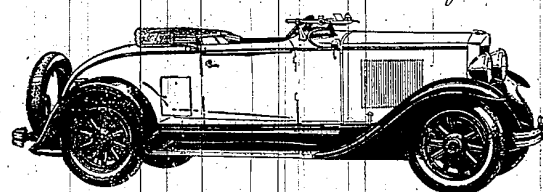
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
