AMERICAN INFLUENCE IN CHINA EXTENSIVE

J. B. Powell, editor of the Shanghai (China) Weekly Review, says:

That the average American at home has little realization of the extent of American influence in the Chinese Republic. I do not mean direct political or economic influence as exerted by Washington or American business and finance, although both are important factors, but rather indirect American influence that has come from the education of Chinese young men and women in the United States or under American auspices in China.

A small group of Chinese students went to the United States about a half century ago, but

they were recalled because the old Chinese Emperor became suspicious when he heard of the studying. But the great impetus came in 1903, when Theodore Roosevelt returned to China several millions of dollars which the United States and the other Powers had assessed against China as penalty for the Boxer Rebellion. The Chinese were so appreciative of Roosevelt's action that they decided to use the money for sending students to the United States for higher educations. Since that time there has been a constant string of Chinese students going to the United States, the present number studying there being approximately 3,000.

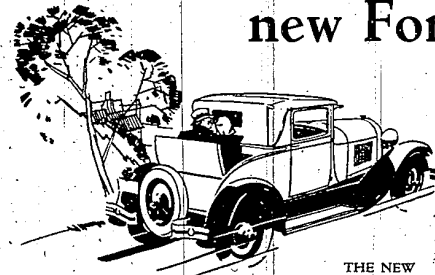
