STEELES LEAVE SOON ON A TRIP THROUGH EUROPE

Farmington and Redford Residents To Spend Summer Abroad

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Steele, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Earl Laing of Redford, will leave Montreal June 28 on the steamer Ansonia for a tour of six European countries.

Arriving in Liverpool they will proceed to London where they will spend three days there and in the vicinity of Shakespeare's home. Crossing over to Holland, three days will be spent followed by a trip up the Rhine and thence by train to Lucerne, Switzerland.

After a tour of Italy, visiting Milan, Florence, Venice, Rome and Genoa, they will return to Geneva, Switzerland, where they will spend one week as American delegates to the World's Educational Federation.

There will be at this convention about 200 American representatives chosen by the N. E. A. and similar delegations from every civilized country on the globe. Preparations are being made for the social entertainment of the visiting delegations.

One of the interesting features will be a visit to the League of Nations in session.


Motor rides over the mountainous country and boat rides on the surrounding lakes will be a part of the entertainment.

After this they will visit "Gay Paris" and leave on the Leviathan and arrive in New York about the middle of August.
