

FUNERAL SERVICE FOR MRS. JENNIE SAMPLE

The funeral of Mrs. Jennie Sample, who died Sunday at the St. Joseph Hospital in Pontiac following an illness of about a year, was held at her home at Walled Lake on Wednesday afternoon. Death was caused by complications, following an attack of diabetes. About a year ago Mrs. Sample was taken ill with an attack of influenza and had never fully recovered, her health failing gradually.

Mrs. Sample, who was Jennie Longenecker, was born in West Newton, Pa., February 19, 1857. She moved to Walled Lake with her parents when she was about six years of age. She was married to Ora C. Sample about 55 years ago, and Mr. Sample died in 1897. No children were born to them. Her nearest surviving relatives are two nieces, Mrs. Helen Nook and Mrs. Margaret

Wilson and four nephews, Ray and Clarence Riley and Cheever and William Hoyt.

Rev. A. K. MacRae officiated at the funeral, with burial in Wixom beside the grave of her husband.

READ BEFORE YOU SIGN— AND RETAIN A COPY

Before you sign any paper, note, contract or mortgage, read it—and keep a copy. In the absence of fraud or misrepresentation you are unalterably bound by its terms.

Signing any contract, form, or paper, without first reading it, is as dangerous as it is frequently expensive. No matter how great your hurry—read carefully and demand a copy.

A few questionable concerns ask that you hastily sign a "receipt," which later turns out to be a guarantee of some one else's charge account. "Questionnaires" for our information sometimes turn out to be contracts to buy advertising space, or a correspondence course, or what not.

Legitimate companies permit full examination of papers to be signed, and gladly furnish copies. There may be persons among disreputable concerns, for failure to give you a copy of your contract. Demand one.

If you don't understand the contract, or appreciate its significance—consult a reputable attorney—Exchange.

NEW YORK'S AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT LAW PROTECTS

New York's new automobile responsibility law which goes into effect September 15, is an example of sensible legislation to curb the reckless and protect the injured.

Under the provisions of the law, any motorist involved in an accident, if he is found guilty of reckless or fast driving, driving while intoxicated or leaving the scene of the accident without reporting it, must give proof of his ability to satisfy any judgment that may be lodged against him, up to \$5,000 for one person, \$10,000 for more than one and \$1,000 property damage. If he is unable to do so, his license is revoked and the registration of his car cancelled.

Also, if a motorist loses a civil suit resulting from an automobile accident, even though he has committed none of the foregoing violations of law, his license is suspended until he meets the judgment and gives proof through a bond, cash, or insurance policy, that he will be financially responsible for any future accidents that may occur.

This law is considered by many experts to represent the most perfect possible accident legislation. It avoids the pit-falls of unconditional compulsory insurance, which has caused such a chaos in Massachusetts. It places the expense, responsibility and punishment where it belongs, on the reckless and incompetent—Exchange.

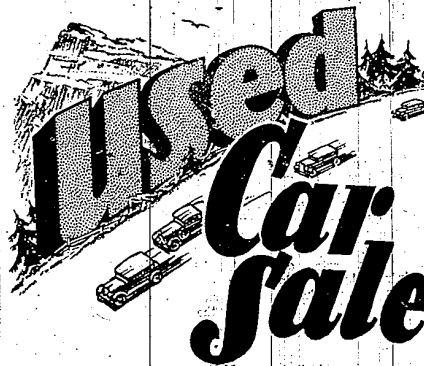
