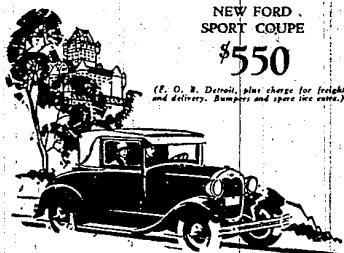

Regular meeting of the commissioners of the City of Farmington, held July 1, 1929.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:55 p. m. Commissioners present: Steinman, Hatton, Goers, Hogle, Gildemeister and Otis.

Moved by Hatton, seconded by Steinman that we build an addition to the police booth 10x16, providing the township is willing to stand half the cost which is not to exceed \$450. Carried.

The matter of purchasing a truck was discussed and action deferred until the next meeting of the commission.

The clerk was instructed to purchase a dozen new water meters. A new street light was ordered placed on the hill near the Catholic church.

Mr. McAlpine of Birmingham, civil engineer and map maker, addressed the commission in regard to making a map of the city. He gave a detailed account of the benefits to be derived from such a map. The estimated cost would be \$3,000.00. Mayor Lamb appointed Otis and Gildemeister a committee to investigate the matter and report.
