Great Diplomat Well Paid, Document Shows

A valuable document, believed to have been stolen from archives of the French government in the revolution of 1789, is included in a special one-copy edition of the life of Talleyrand, which is being bound for a member of the Talleyrand family. The paper orders the payment of 300,000 francs to Charles Maurice de Talleyrand-Perigord, France's most famous statesman, for his services as ambassador to the court of St. James in the reign of Louis XVIII. The paper given him for preparing that monarch's accession to the throne.

The paper is interesting and curious, in that it reveals the astonishing sum paid Talleyrand in this period, 300,000 francs being almost a princely fortune, far above the average reward of ambassadors.

A woman, who gathered the material for the special edition, found the document in the hands of an autograph collector. It is considered the gem of the entire collection, which includes many personal letters and valuable records of intrigue and romance in French life under the Bourbon King—Kansas City Star.

WALLED LAKE PHONE CO. SALE TO MICHIGAN BELL IS APPROVED BY STATE

The Michigan Public Utilities commission this week approved the sale of the Walled Lake Home Telephone Company by E. V. Mercer to the Michigan Bell Telephone Company. The matter is now in the hands of the Interstate Commerce Commission, but this is understood to be a mere formality and when they pass it, the Michigan Bell Telephone will take over the business. Mr. Mercer will be retained as manager and the office and exchange will remain at his place of business.

It is understood the price was between twenty and thirty thousand dollars.

In the fall of 1920 Mr. Mercer purchased the telephone business then in the hands of local stockholders and immediately started an expansion and building of the lines.

In 1922 the worst sleet storm in the history of public utilities broke off poles, snapped lines and wrecked the entire system. A storm which a good many companies could not weather. Beginning over again the lines were rebuilt and poles reset with an eye to future storms.

In 1920 there were 119 subscribers and one toll line shared with Milford. Today there are nearly 300 subscribers and twelve toll lines, seven to Detroit, two to Pontiac and one to Plymouth, one to Northville and one to Farmington. The increase in both toll and subscribers reflects the growth of the section.

Mr. Mercer has had twenty-three years experience in the telephone business. He is member of the telephone pioneers of America, and was associated with the Bell Telephone Company for ten years previous to coming here. He was Wire Chief at Wyandotte and Plant Chief at Mount Clemens. He got his start in the telephone business in Ohio. Lines were strung across country and not along the highways and "trouble shooting" was made by a lineman on horseback.

The territory of Walled Lake will doubtless be enlarged considerably by the new owner of the system and phones or other exchanges added to the Walled Lake exchange although this has not been definitely decided upon. The approval of the order among other things instructs that rates, service and other conditions will continue as they now are.

Several islands off the coast of Maine are being connected with the mainland by telephone cables this summer.
