

TWO MEN TAKEN HERE SENTENCED ON GUN CHARGES

Suspects Had Revolver Under Floor-Boards of Car; Go To Jackson

Two of three men arrested two months ago in Farmington by deputy sheriffs, on charges of carrying concealed weapons have been convicted and sentenced to terms in the State prison at Jackson. The men will begin to serve their term immediately.

Those sentenced were Fred Fairfield, 36, 4304 Trumbull avenue, Detroit, and Joseph Murray, 28, 4736 Lincoln avenue, Detroit. Fairfield is to serve three to 10 years at Jackson, and Murray is to serve from 2 1/2 to 10 years.

The two men, with a companion, were halted on Grand River avenue by the Farmington officers following an alarm from Brighton, where suspicious characters had been reported loitering in the town for some time. The Farmington deputies picked up the men on Grand River and chased them to the crossing in front of the Farmington lumber yard. There the suspects' car was run into the curb and stopped.

Revolvers were ingeniously concealed in the car, wired to the battery beneath the floor-boards. All three men stood mute when arraigned, and were held in \$3,000 bond.

Investigation at Brighton disclosed no evidence of crime, nor were the men arrested in Farmington connected with the suspicions aroused at Brighton. The presence of concealed weapons in the car, however, caused the prison sentences.

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FRED STAMAN IS FIRST TO START NEW MONEY 'GOING'

Awaits Initial Shipment On Wednesday Morning; Small Bills Only Ready

Uncle Sam's new currency, one third smaller than the older bills, was put into circulation in Farmington Wednesday. Fred Staman was the first to get some of the small-sized bills, at the Farmington State Savings Bank, during the morning.

Only new currency is being issued by that bank from now on. The Peoples State Bank expects to start distribution of the new money Friday morning.

Issuance of the new money in Farmington was delayed by the fact that registered mail is held up one day in Redford, according to information obtained. Edgar S. Pierce, cashier, learning of the delay, went to Redford and obtained the shipment from the post-office. Mr. Staman was waiting for the new money when it arrived.

For the present, both Farmington banks and others elsewhere will have only the smaller denominations, one, two, five, ten and twenty-dollar bills to distribute. The larger denominations will be issued as rapidly as the bills can be printed and sent to the banks throughout the country.

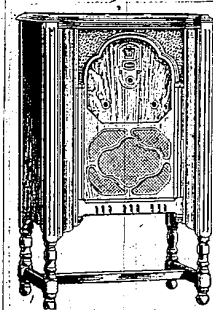

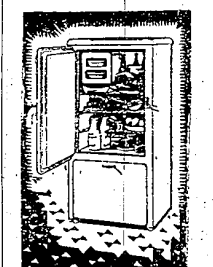
