TWO NEW ATTRACTIONS

A new roadway has been built and a second bridge constructed across the River Rouge at Edgewater Park, on the Seven-Mile road, near Grand River, to facilitate further the movement of automobiles into the park. This change provides free parking space for more than 8,000 cars at the park.
