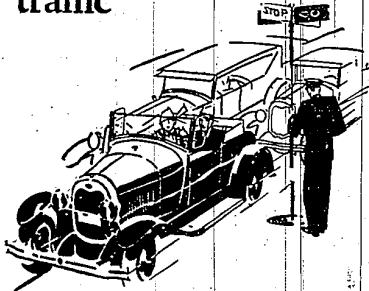

#### FOUR PEOPLE OF SAME TOWN HURT IN CRASHES

Two accidents involving four Walled Lake residents occurred at the corner of Liberty and Pontiac street, Saturday and Sunday. W. S. Wikom, driving south on Pontiac street and Mrs. G. H. Chafy driving north came together Saturday afternoon damaging both cars badly and injuring Mrs. Chafy's daughter Doris. The impact of the collision threw Doris through the windshield, bruising her head and cutting her hands slightly on the glass. The fenders and running board on the left side of the Chafy car were badly smashed, the windshield broken and two tires knocked off. Mrs. Chafy and Doris were the only occupants of the car.

The Wikom car, driven by Mr. Wikom, accompanied by Mrs. Wikom and their three children, was damaged the worst. The front left wheel was broken off, the front axle bent and the fender crumpled.

On Sunday morning, the cars of Matt Voglar and Mrs. Albert Richardson crashed at the same spot and in the same manner. Mrs. Richardson was going south and Mr. Voglar north. As they came together another car, the name of the owner unknown, hit the two machines. The fenders and running board on the Voglar car were damaged and the front fender and tire were damaged on the Richardson car. No one was injured.

This corner is the scene of almost daily accidents, some only minor and others more serious. The County Road Commission has been notified of the condition and something is expected to be done by them to make this intersection more safe.

#### OLD RESIDENT HONORED AT PARTY BY DAUGHTERS

Honoring her father, Mortimer E. Phelps, whose age is 82 years, Mrs. Clark Murdock entertained at her home on the 13-Mile road at a birthday dinner on August 11th. Guests attended from Detroit, Berkley, Walled Lake, Novi and Farmington.

Mr. Phelps was born in the town of Greece, Monroe County, New York August 11, 1847 and came here at the age of 6 years with his father and mother, Erasmus and Hannah Phelps and two brothers, Alfred H. and Byron C., and an adopted sister, Martha, settling in Novi Township, Oakland County, having lived there ever since, except nine years spent in Detroit.

Mr. Phelps was married to Mary A. Clark of Novi October 27, 1874. Four children were born to them: Earl E. of Berkley, Alvina Murdock, living on the 13-Mile road, Charles E. of Detroit and James M. at home. Mr. and Mrs. Phelps have been married 55 years, having celebrated their golden wedding anniversary a few years ago. Mrs. Phelps is now 75 years of age.

Mr. Phelps played in the Bloomfield and Walled Lake bands for several years and is the only member out of the family of four to survive. The others passed on a few years ago.
