WINGED POSTMAN POPULAR

The amount of mail that flies from the nation's capital to all parts of the country is four times as large as it was one year ago. Furthermore, the bulging pouches of mail grow more numerous and bulging every month. In round statistics, mail planes now fly 50,000 miles daily across 41 states and into Canada, Mexico and Central America. These figures, given by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of the United States which alone has 30,000 miles of airways.

A reduction in the air postal rate from five to two cents has been suggested even though the deficit in the Post Office Department was largely attributed to loss of money on air mail. The reduction has been suggested as a sure means of increasing the air mail business to the point where the government will find it profitable to make contracts with air companies on the basis of space used as is done in the case of railroads. This would mean no loss of revenue to Uncle Sam as well as a nice slice of cake for grateful subjects.

NEW LAW ON PIKE

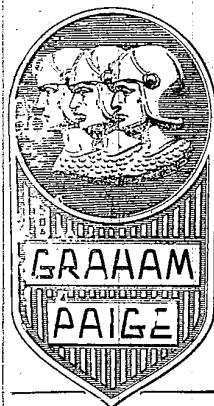
