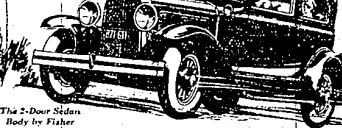

TAXIDERMISTS AIDED

Michigan commercial taxidermists may hereafter be authorized to possess during closed seasons protected birds and animals which have been legally taken under the provisions of the new law that authorizes the director of the conservation department to issue these taxidermy licenses. Taxidermists customarily have specimens for mounting in their possession after the close of the season in which the animals were legally killed, and while the department has always adopted a lenient attitude in such cases, strictly speaking the taxidermists were violating the state game laws. The new provisions are intended to be of actual assistance to them, and not an added restriction.

NEW TRAPPING LAW

Trappers this fall will be required to have their traps marked with a tag or plate bearing the owner's name and address. This phase of the new game law now in effect further states that the name and address shall be in the English language.

The old law which required numbered metal tags which were issued with muskrat trapping licenses, to be attached to traps, resulted in much confusion and delaying the apprehending of violators. It was necessary for wardens to communicate with the department at Lansing in order to determine the ownership of illegally set traps and by that time it often was too late to catch the owner.

WORLD'S MOST CAREFUL AUTO DRIVER IS FOUND

More than 190,000 miles in 12 years, represents the service rendered by a 1917 Oakland roadster purchased in 1919 by L. R. Chippell of Comstock Park, near Grand Rapids, Mich.

While the mileage on the car within itself is remarkable and noteworthy, the most unusual record observed is that while all of the essential parts of the automobile, such as the axles, engine block, chassis, body and even the fenders are original equipment, there is not a single dent in the fenders.

With such a record, Mr. Chippell can easily claim to be the world's most careful driver until challenged by some worthy opponent.

Chippell is a carpenter with a flair for things mechanical. Recently he revealed a remarkable record with his Oakland when he called at a service station in Grand Rapids and purchased a new part. At that time Mr. Chippell stated that he had purchased the car after it had been driven 7,000 miles in twelve years time.

VALUABLE COW SAVED FROM SLAUGHTER PEN

Records of butterfat production for a grade cow which was offered for sale for \$50 seven years ago in Eaton County show that the animal has returned \$1,005.84 above the cost of her feed since that time, and she has one slaughter which paid \$160.81 more than the cost of her feed into the herd profits last year.

The records of these two animals were made available thru the accounts kept on the production and feed for each animal in herds entered in herd improvement association work. Such records make it possible for dairymen to select their most profitable animals for breeding stock and to cull out the unprofitable cows.
