Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Rowe and family of Windsor, Can. were the Sunday guests of the former's sister, Mrs. A. Owen.

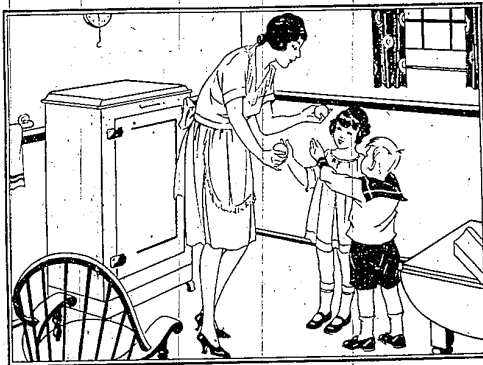

PRESERVE FOOD to Protect Health



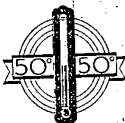
Safeguard with Refrigeration

The maintenance of good health depends in great measure on the selection of proper foods and the nourishment of properly balanced meals. More than that, good health necessitates food protected against spoilage, kept wholesome in the protective cold of a refrigerator.

Nearly all food is perishable—it must be guarded the year around by some method of refrigeration. The lack of some form of food preservation constitutes a menace to health.

Window boxes and back porch makeshifts are unsatisfactory, insanitary, unsafe. A constant temperature is essential. Health authorities everywhere recommend artificial refrigeration as the only safe method of preserving foods. Take this step now, and safeguard the health of your family.
