"WINGS OVER EUROPE" TO BE SHOWN AT WILSON

The romance of science bringing eternal peace to humanity is the theme of "Wings Over Europe," the startling play which the New York Theatre Guild offers next week at the Wilson Theatre. A poetic young scientist discovers a secret with which it is possible to create a new civilization or destroy the present one and he threatens to do one or the other despite opposition of the entire British Cabinet. Ideas and wits clash to the music of poetry in this portrayal of intense and upsetting drama. The play was a sensation in New York and provoked bitter controversy among the critics, clergy, and statesmen.

"Wings Over Europe" was written by Robert Nichols and Maurice Browne. Mr. Nichols is a British poet, a philosopher of note, former professor of English literature at the University of Tokyo, scenario writer for Douglas Fairbanks, and an amateur scientist to boot. He has written a play "Guilty Souls," and numerous works of poetry, novels and philosophical pieces. His more familiar titles are "Under the Yew," "Aurelia," "Arduous and Endeavors" and "Fantasia." Mr. Browne, the collaborator, is a Cambridge man and is perhaps best known as the founder of the Little Theatre movement in America. Just now he is a successful producer, being responsible for that other all-male dramatic hit, "Journey's End," to be seen in various spots all over the globe.

The leading role of the Shelley-like scientist is played by Alexander Kirkland. He was last seen as Marchbanks in "Candida" and Woo Hoo Git in "The Yellow Jacket." Ernest Lawford, well-known for his abortive Sullivan roles, has the part of the Prime Minister of England, and Hugh Buckler appears as secretary of State for War. Morris Carnovsky, late of "Marco Millions" portrays the Minister of Foreign Affairs, and there are 15 others in the cast. It is directed by Reuben Mamoulian who also staged the Guild's "Porgy."

APPEALS FOR AID IN REDUCING ACCIDENTS

Comparing the killing of 1989 children under the age of five years by automobiles in the United States in the year 1928 with the killing of infants by ancient idol-worshippers, H. O. Rounds, director of traffic and safety of the Detroit Automobile Club Tuesday, appealed to the Walled Lake Exchange Club to aid in the drive to eliminate accidents. Twenty-seven thousand persons were killed by automobiles last year and 240,000 injured.

The six causes of accidents given by Mr. Rounds were failure to give the right-of-way to cars approaching from the right; failure to give a signal of the drivers intention to stop, turn or drive away from the curb; exceeding the speed limit; driving while drunk and asleep at the wheel.

In commenting on the fact that the majority of pedestrians killed are over 55 years of age he stated the youth of today should be taught the street is a dangerous place, to have their subconscious minds instinctively warn

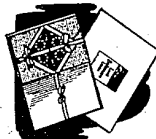
