

Livonian To Head NSH

Homemakers Install New C'ville Officers

A Livonia psychiatrist will take over Monday as medical superintendent of Northville State Hospital.

He is Richard D. Budd, M.D., of 1730 Fairfield. He served on the NSH staff from the time it was opened in 1953 until 1957, when he left to go into private practice.

Dr. Budd succeeds Dr. E. Gordon Yudashkin, who will move to Lansing as assistant director of NSH's parent, the State Department of Mental Health.

Dr. Yudashkin's promotion was announced several months ago, but he couldn't assume his new duties until a successor could be found at Northville.

The appointment was announced by Dr. William H. Anderson, director of the state agency.

Dr. Budd will operate a 1,600-bed hospital serving the mentally ill in the western Detroit and Wayne County area.

A native Detroit, he earned his undergraduate and medical degrees from Wayne State University, served his medical internship at Grace Hospital from 1948-49, completed his residency in psychiatry at a veterans hospital in Topeka, Kans. in 1952 and served at Topeka State Hospital from 1952-53.

At Northville from 1953-57, he was chief of the female section and assistant clinical director. He participated in setting up new treatment sections and programs as additional new buildings came into use.

Lincoln Inn Hosts Exhibit

Top Republicans For McLaughlin

Bill McLaughlin, Republican leader from Northville, has locked up as much powerful support as it's possible to get in his bid for the party's state chairmanship.

A "leadership meeting" in Lansing Wednesday "enthusiastically accepted" McLaughlin, according to outgoing State Chairman Ely Peterson. The "leadership" included Gov. Romney, Lt. Gov. William Milliken, Sen. Robert Griffin, Rep. Elford Cederberg (speaking for the state's 12 GOP congressmen), the legislative minority and district chairmen.

"THEY'LL RECOMMEND Bill to the Convention" next spring, Mrs. Peterson said. "That doesn't preclude anyone else from running, but it is a strong recommendation."

McLaughlin's position as leading contender for the state chairmanship was reported by The Observer Newspapers last summer in a story that "scooped" even metropolitan papers.

Mrs. Peterson, chairman since 1965, will step down next year and devote her full political time to being national committeewoman, a post to which she was elected at the August national convention.

The chairmanship post pays \$21,000 a year.

"I BROUGHT Bill in as executive director two months after I came," Mrs. Peterson said. "He started at \$12,000 and was later raised to \$15,000. It's presumed he will hire his own executive director if he's elected chairman."

Mrs. Peterson said McLaughlin is "not conspicuous as a person but does a conspicuously good job" in the party organization.

A native of Syracuse, N.Y., McLaughlin, 36, worked his way up through the Young Republicans and the Romney campaign to become Macomb County chairman before moving to Northville. His line of work has been public relations.

Bank Hikes Dividend
