NEAR RAILROAD LEVEL

The expense of travel by commercial plane is being reduced to a point where it soon will match the cost per mile of individual railroad transportation, it is declared by S. H. Adler, Inc., Oakland-Pontiac dealer at Monroe, La., who recently visited the Oakland Motor Car company at Pontiac, during an air journey of 5,600 miles.

Mr. Adler's "air fare" for the entire trip totalled \$602 or ten and three-quarters cents per mile. This compares with an average cost of between three and four cents per mile for travel by rail.
